1) What enabled Ezekiel to stand up? What type of book does he eat? Does he do it?

- 2) What words are used to describe the people to whom Ezekiel would prophesy?
- 3) What did God want the people to know? What instructions did He give Ezekiel?

4) Does it seem like Ezekiel is hesitant to be God's messenger?

- 5) How should we measure the success of God's spokesmen?
- 6) What do we learn about God from this text?

July 23rd Lesson 4) Jerusalem's Destiny Symbolized (Ch 4-5) Personal Summary of the text:

What questions did you have about this text that you would like to discuss?

1) What signs does Ezekiel act out? Why might God have him do this?

2) How bad would things get in Israel according to 5:7-10?

3) Why would Israel suffer in this way? What lessons can we learn from this?

4) Do Ezekiel's dramatic presentations of God's word have any bearing on dramatic presentations today? If so, what dangers should be considered?

5) How can this text be connected to Jesus?

2) How could the God of love reach a point of "no pity"?

3) How does this text connect with Jesus?

4) Is idolatry still prevalent today? How so?

5) What does this text teach us about money?

1) How was Ezekiel taken on a Temple tour? What did he see?

- 3) Who are the six men of **9:1-11**? What do they do? How did Ezekiel respond?

6) What is the final resting place of God's glory in 11:23?

7) Ch 8-11 have been called Ezekiel's "Temple Vision." Where is God's Temple today? How might this reality affect our view of purity in His House today?

1) What does God have Ezekiel act out? What might be the meaning of these actions?

2) What character does God prophecy about starting in **12:10**? Who hunts this person?

3) Who were the people left behind in 12:16? Why wight they be left there?

4) How did the prophets mock Ezekiel? How did Israel determine who true prophets were?

5) How could this chapter be connected to Jesus?

6) What do we learn about God in this text? Where in scripture is God described as a Judge?

If we aren't supposed to condemn, is it hateful to warn people that God does?

How should we warn people of this divine reality?

1) What type of wall is found in **13:10-11**? What happens to it? What might this mean?

2) What type of women are described in 13:17-23? How could this happen today?

3) Why is God mad about the elders sitting before Ezekiel? Who will He punish?

4) Could God deceive prophets? Where else is this described in scripture?

5) How are God's actions described in **13:8-14**? How might this connect to the NT?

6) Why are Noah, Job, & Daniel mentioned in 14:14?

7) How can Ezekiel 13-14 help us identify modern false prophets/teachers?

1) What drastic action is described in 16:5? Why is Jerusalem described as Canaanite?

2) How bad did their sin get? Where did they place their trust?

3) What did they do to their children in 16:20-22?

4) How is Israel described in 16:43? How is God described in 16:60?

5) How would God punish Israel in 16:38? What purpose did this serve?

6) Where is the church described as 'the bride of Christ'? Should certain chapters in the bible not be read publicly in worship? eg. Ezekiel 16, 23

3) What are some lessons we can learn from Ch 18? How does it address pessimism or fatalism? Individual accountability?

More optimistically, what hope does it offer us about leadership?

4) Who is the lament for in Ch 19? How might Ch 17-19 connect to Jesus?

5) What do these chapters teach us about God?

6) Ch 18 is often the source of great debate, it is sandwiched by 17 & 19 which discuss the destruction & restoration of what promise of God? How is this relevant to us?

1) What repeated words or key words do you see in Israel's story?

2) What mistake(s) does Israel make in 20:1-4? Why did they look for leaves & trees? 20:28

3) Why does 20:14-17 & 20:22 say God spared Israel? What might that mean for us?

4) What did God say about them "seeking Him" in 20:31? What does He then declare in 20:32?

5) Who is given credit for leading Israel back to Zion after exile in **20:41-44**? Why does it happen? How do we see the grace of God not just in the NT story but also in the OT story?

6) This is God's version of Israel's Story. Is this how they would tell their own story? How would we tell our story? How would God tell our story? How about our congregation?

1) What is the "the sword" of Ch 21? Why are the "righteous" included in death? 21:3-5

2) Who gets the sword in 21:11-13? When does 21:27 say "the crown" would return?

3) What sins of Isreal are listed in Ch 22? What mistake(s) did the priests make in 22:26?

4) **21:8-17** has been called by some "The Sword Song." Do our hymns & songs reflect the depth of our sin? Why or why not? If yes, name some examples.

5) What do these chapters teach us about God? Why did Ezekiel groan deeply in **21:6-7**?

6) Read 22:30. Who will ultimately "stand in the gap" for us?

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
