At the time this gospel was written? 6) How was this early Christian book received by Jews? 7) MOST IMPORTANT: What can we learn from Jesus' enemies in this gospel?

Many of the oldest copies of John's Gospel do not include the story of the adulterous woman. 1) Why did the Pharisees bring this woman to Jesus? What famous line stumped them? 2) What did Jesus tell the woman? 3) What does Jesus say next that provokes the Pharisees? 4) What did Jesus mean when He accused them of not knowing The Father? 5) Where did Jesus say they were from & why? When did Jesus say they would find out who He was? 6) When Jesus spoke of the Father, what Father did they think of? Who did Jesus say their Father was? 7) How did Jesus address their charges of demon possession? 8) What did Jesus say about the afterlife that upset the Jews? 9) What did Jesus say about Abraham? Why did they want to stone Jesus?

10) How does this discussion impact our walk with God?

- 1) Why did Jesus say this man had been born blind?
- 2) What problem did the Pharisees have with this particular miracle of Jesus?
- 3) What did some of the people say in defense of Jesus?
- 4) Who was called in to question about the man born blind? Did they? Why?
- 5) Upon questioning the formerly blind man a second time what does he say?
- 6) How does the man defend Jesus the third time? How do they respond to him?
- 7) What does Jesus tell the man? What does Jesus say to the Pharisees? Why?
