Introduction to the Book of Leviticus

"Do you struggle to understand Leviticus? You are not alone! For many, Leviticus seems boring, irrelevant, or in some cases, just wrong. But what if Leviticus actually answers some of our deepest questions, such as: What is our purpose? What is life all about? Where can I find hope? What if Leviticus sets out a vision for human flourishing that meets our heart's deepest longings? In fact, Leviticus does all of these things—if we are willing to give it a chance." Are you willing to give it a chance?

Thus begins the introduction to a 200+ page Bible workbook* on Leviticus. This workbook contains only a small portion of the questions found in <u>Leviticus Bible Study</u> by Scott Behm & Jay Sklar (Gleanings Press, 2019). Their goal & mine is to help you understand Leviticus &, better yet, see how it connects with the Good News of God's righteousness found in Jesus the Christ. Jesus our sin offering brings us peace & fellowship, allows us to gather as priests for public worship, & to remind us of our need for holiness & neighborliness.

God breathed out every word of Scripture & we believe with Paul that it is "profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; so that the man of God may be adequate equipped for every good work." (1 Timothy 3:16-17) Leviticus, as with all Scripture, contributes to the overarching story of God intervening in man's mess to make all things right. The Mosaic Law played a critical role in Israel's story & now impacts our story as we continue to live by the eternal principles, "You shall be holy, for I am holy." (1 Peter 1:16/Lev 19:2) & "Love your neighbor as yourself." (Mark 12:31/Lev 19:18)

To help us start our reading journey, Scott Behm offers five tips for reading Leviticus well. I've summarized them into three questions. (1) What would this have meant to an ancient Israelite? Avoid the temptation to sit in judgment on the strange parts of this law. Much of these things would make more sense in an Ancient Near Eastern (ANE) religious context. (2) What is this passage or principle teaching me about my God? While specific laws may no longer apply to us, the values or reasons behind the laws teach us about the character of our God. This allows us to know God better. This is His chosen self-revelation, not some man's opinions about God. (3) How does this text or subject fit into the larger Biblical story of King Jesus? The sacrifices & the priests remind us of our need & desire to enter back into perfect fellowship with Him in Eden. It is good that God didn't leave Israel, or our generation, in the dark. He provided a beautiful light that points to *The Way* back to Eden. (Acts 19:8-10, 23/Revelation 21:22-22:5)

Jesus told His disciples that he came to fulfill everything that was written in the Law & prophets (Luke 24:25-27, 44-48). Phillip began proclaiming Jesus from the passage in Isaiah that the eunuch was reading. One of my goals is to connect every OT passage to Jesus. Behm remarks, "The more I have studied sacrifice in Leviticus, the more meaningful & beautiful the Lord's Supper has become to me. ...These laws serve as a window into God's heart and therefore deserve our earnest study & reflection."

- 6) Write down the sins that would require an offering from **Leviticus 5:1-13**. What sin is discussed in **Leviticus 6:1-5**?
- 7) Who is the focus of Lev 6:8-7:38? How did they begin & end their day? Cf. Lev 6:20
- 8) What does Jesus say about His blood in Matthew 26:27-28?

5) How often would these laws of uncleanness come up in everyday life? How did these laws compare to the rest of the Ancient Near Eastern world?
6) Were the uncleanness laws for males only, females only, or both? Why?
7) What sets Christians apart from the world today?
8) What does Paul tell the Philippian Christians to focus on in Philippians 4:8-9 ? When should Christians do this?

Feb 14 6) The Day of Atonement Lev Ch 16

- 1) When you come before God in prayer and worship, how guilty or confident do you feel?
- 2) What are the directions for the Day of Atonement? Were there clothing rules? Why?
- 3) What is the setting in **Leviticus 16:1**? What is the mercy seat? How was it handled?
- 4) What happened to the scapegoat? What was said? Where did it happen?
- 5) How long were the commands for this day supposed to last?
- 6) How does **Hebrews 9** contrast Jesus' offering with this sacrificial offering?
- 7) How does Isaiah 53 describe Jesus' offering in similar terms to the scapegoat?

Feb 28 7) Laws on Sex & Worship Lev Ch 18, 20

These questions are based on **Chapter 20**. If time allows, read Leviticus 18 also.

1) Why did God give laws about sex? Are churches welcoming toward sexual sinners?

2) How were mediums & Molech related? **Lev 20:1-8, 27**. How did they challenge God?

3) What role did parents play in ancient society? How are they connected to Molech?

4) What sexual practices were forbidden & what were the consequences of these sins?

5) What are some examples of how these sins are treated as harmless by some today?

- 6) How would God handle those who overlooked the sin as harmless? Cf 20:4-5
- 7) What lessons about sexual sin can we learn from 1 Corinthians 5-6?


Mar 6 8) Being A Good Neighbor

- 1) What does holiness mean? Do you think of neighborliness? Why?
- 2) What laws in **Ch 19** surprise you & why? What areas of life do they address?
- 3) How is parental honor carried forward into the NT? How does it affect neighbors?
- 4) How is idolatry carried forward into the NT? How does it affect neighbors?
- 5) How is care for the poor carried forward? How does it affect neighbors?
- 6) How is care for the handicapped carried forward? How does it affect neighbors?
- 7) How is sexual purity carried forward? How does it affect neighbors?
- 8) How is respect for elders carried forward? How does it affect neighbors?
- 9) How is care for strangers carried forward? How does it affect neighbors?
- 10) Why do you think Jesus used this chapter to answer "the greatest command"?
- 11) What answers to modern problems does this chapter give?

Why was this restriction given? 5) How has our modern world violated some of these principles? 6) Do you feel more often blessed or cursed by God? Why do you feel this way? 7) How do the blessings of Ch 26 echo the conditions of Eden? Cf. v3-13 8) What did God say He would make desolate in 26:27-33? Why? (v34) 9) What causes God to "remember them"? (v40-45) How does the NT treat circumcision?
